

2018 FIELD STAFF

Greg Legg returns having won a total of 274 games during his four prior seasons (2002-2004 and 2017) as manager of the Fightin Phils. Prior to his return to Reading last season, Legg had a successful tenure with advanced-A Clearwater (2015-2016). Both teams combined had a record of 161-112 (.590%) and made a playoff appearance in 2015. He won Florida State League Manager of the Year in 2015 after leading his team to the best record in the Florida State League.

Legg began his coaching career with Clearwater (A+) in 1995 and Scranton in 1996. He made his managerial debut in 1997 for Batavia (A). He also managed Martinsville (R) in 1998, Batavia in 1999 and Piedmont (A) in 2000. He managed low-A Lakewood (2001 and 2014) and was their hitting coach from 2008-2013. He managed Williamsport (R) in 2007, its first season as a Phillies affiliate since 1962. In 2011, he was honored with the John Vukovich Award, presented annually to a coach in the Phillies minor league system.

He was drafted by the Phillies in the 22nd round of the 1982 draft out of Southeastern Oklahoma State University in Durant, Oklahoma. He played in 238 career games with Reading as an infielder from 1983-1984 and again in 1988. He made it to the major leagues in 1986 and 1987, appearing in fourteen games.

Steve Schrenk joins the Reading staff as pitching coach for a third straight season and fourth overall with the team (2009). The 49-year old spent 16 years (1987-2002) pitching professionally, including two seasons with Philadelphia, before transitioning to a coaching career in 2003. Schrenk has coached in the Phillies minor league system since 2004 and has been a pitching coach for advanced-A Clearwater (204, 2007-08, 2015), single-A Lakewood (2005, 2010-12), and rookie-level Gulf Coast Phillies (2013-14).

Kevin Riggs will be entering his first season as hitting coach for the Fightin Phils. He joins the Phillies organization from the Altoona Curve (AA) of the Pittsburgh Pirates where he was their hitting coach for three seasons (2015-2017). Prior to that, Riggs began his coaching career with Casper (R) in 2007. He also made stops in Asheville (Class-A) and Modesta (Class A-Advanced). He was named manager for the Tulsa Drillers for two seasons (2013-2014) where he compiled a 139-138 record and made it to the league finals in 2014.

Rico Brogna returns to Reading as an assistant coach after a 15 year hiatus. Brogna coached in Reading in 2002 after a nine-year professional career that included stops in Detroit, New York, Philadelphia, Boston and Atlanta. He managed the Mobile Baybears (AA) in 2010 and finished with a 75-62 record. He joined the Angels' organization as a special assistant to the general manager in 2013 and became the Angels' player-information coach in 2014.

Mickey Kozack returns for his second straight season as athletic trainer for the Fightin Phils. He'll be entering his 12th season as a full-time staff athletic trainer with the Philadelphia Phillies. He spent three years (2014-2016) with Clearwater (A+) and six years (2008-2013) with Lakewood (A). Kozack spent the 2007 season with Williamsport and served as an intern in 2006 with Scranton/Wilkes-Barre (AAA). In addition to being a certified athletic trainer (ATC), he is also a certified health education specialist (CHES).

Mike Lidge will make his Fightin Phils debut as the strength and conditioning coach in 2018. He joined the Philadelphia Phillies organization in 2017 as the strength and conditioning coach in Clearwater and previously held the same position for four years (2013-2016) with the San Francisco Giants for Richmond (AA), San Jose (A) and the Arizona League Giants (R). He has a Master of Science in Exercise Science and his Bachelor of Science in Kinesiology from Northeastern Illinois University.

Arauz surfaced for one appearance with the Fightin Phils at the end of June when they were in need of bullpen arms, pitching in one game at FirstEnergy Stadium against the eventual division champion Trenton Thunder. 2017 was a little bit different for the righthander, who predominately pitched in relief for the first time in his career. He didn't make his first start until July 4 in Daytona when he threw six scoreless innings for the win, and he'd later return to the rotation with five of his last six appearances coming as a starter. He made history on July 30 at Bright House Field against Fort Myers when he threw a 7-inning no-hitter in the second game of a doubleheader. One month later, Arauz made his final start of the season, and was the hard luck loser in an 8-inning, 10-strikeout performance against the Dunedin Blue Jays.

2017:

Began the season in Extended Spring Training before being assigned to Lakewood (A) on April 28...Made 8 appearances for the BlueClaws and was sent to Clearwater (A+) on May 16...In six starts with the Threshers, he was 2-3 with a 2.80 ERA...In 14 relief appearances, he was 2-1 with a 1.26 ERA...Lefties hit .185 against Arauz while righties batted .185.

NO-HITTER NOTES: (7.0 IP, BB, career-high 10 SO) Was the only no-hitter in the Florida State League last season...Prior to the no-hitter, he had thrown just one complete game in his career...58 of his 76 total pitches were strikes and he retired the first 19 batters he faced before issuing a one-out walk in the seventh for the Miracle's only baserunner.

Bettencourt's made quite the impression since being taken in the 25th round of the 2016 June draft out of UC Santa Barbara. Given that his draft position wasn't that high and he has a total of 43 games under his belt, the fact that he's starting the season as the Fightin Phils least experienced pitcher speaks volumes. In his first full season a year ago, he had tremendous numbers in Lakewood's (A) bullpen and earned a South Atlantic League Midseason All-Star Selection. The jump to Clearwater later in the season actually had a positive effect on his numbers, and despite a shorter workload in the Florida State League, his WHIP dipped from 1.04 to 0.74. It's a very small sample size, but Bettencourt's strikeout-to-walk ratio of 77:9 in just 58.2 innings is an unbelievable number for a rookie. Of course, the move to the Eastern League is a challenging one, and as long as Bettencourt continues to hammer the strike zone, he'll have **Steve Schrenk** to guide him and help him improve so that he can help the Fightin Phils eat up innings late in ballgames.

2017: South Atlantic League Midseason All-Star

Pitched in 25 games with Lakewood (A), compiling a 3-2 record and a 3.28 ERA with 8 saves on 11 tries...Allowed just one home run and had 55 strikeouts to 5 walks in 35.2 innings pitched...Didn't allow a run for 17.0 innings during an 11-game stretch from April 11-May 30...On May 6, struck out the only batter he faced to combine with **Nick Fanti** on a 9-inning no-hitter in a 1-0 win against the Columbia Fireflies...Missed close to two weeks with a left oblique strain from April 16-28...Assigned to Clearwater (A+) on July 12 for the rest of the season and went 2-0 with a 1.57 ERA in 16 games, adding two saves...The Florida State League batted just .157 against him (13 hits allowed in 23.0 innings)...Didn't allow a run in 12.0 innings pitched across 8 road games...15 of his 41 appearances during the season were for 2.0 innings or more...Went to the Arizona Fall League after the season and had a 10.13 ERA in 8 games, pitching just 8.0 innings for the Glendale Desert Dogs.

Cleavinger didn't have to go very far when he was acquired by the Phillies right before the trade deadline as part of the Jeremy Hellickson deal. A third round pick of the Orioles out of the University of Oregon in 2015, the lefthander never left the Eastern League in 2017 after appearing in 27 games for the Bowie Baysox. Cleavinger dominated the lower levels for his first full year in the Orioles organization, but intermittent control issues have underscored his very promising left arm. He's still young and won't turn 24 until the end of April, so maybe a full year under Philadelphia's control and a chance to work on some things in Spring Training will do the trick. Cleavinger can be unhittable, and he was able to strike out three batters in three of his 11 appearances for the Fightin Phils during the final month of last season. Even while he racked up an even 6-ERA in 38 Double-A games a year ago, he was still able to strike out 59 batters in 54.0 innings. For his career, he's averaged around 11 SO/9 IP, which is why the Phillies sent him to the Arizona Fall League in the offseason. If it clicks for Cleavinger, he has a chance to be a very effective reliever, and will certainly help the Fightin Phils early on with a chance to advance to Lehigh Valley if he can limit the walks.

2017:

Started the season with Bowie (AA), where he pitched to a 2.45 ERA during his first six appearances in April...Was used for more than an inning in half of his 38 appearances for the Baysox and Fightins a year ago...Posted good numbers against the Fightin Phils, allowing just 3 hits in 16 ABs (.188) with 3 walks and 7 strikeouts...Converted 4-of-8 save opportunities during the season, including the Fightins last win in Trenton in the second game of a doubleheader on September 2 at ARM & HAMMER Park...Cleavinger's save in the 8th inning preserved a 2-0 shutout for **Tyler Viza** (10-10), who threw 7.0 scoreless innings and passed **Drew Anderson** for the team lead in wins on the second-to-last day of the season...Threw 2.0 innings in 5 of his 11 appearances with the Fightins, accumulating a 5.28 ERA during that time.

2016: Ranked as the Orioles #26 Prospect by Baseball America

"The Orioles saw Cleavinger touch 97 mph in the Cape Cod League in the 2014 and they drafted him in the third round in 2015, signing him for \$500,000. He was first-team Pacific-12 Conference in 2015, going 6-2, 1.58 with 66 strikeouts over 40 innings for Oregon. Early in the college season, Cleavinger's velocity was down at 89-92 mph, and that is mostly what the Orioles saw when he pitched at short-season Aberdeen, though they are confident there is more there. He showed a solid curveball with good depth at 75-78 mph and needs to work on his changeup. Cleavinger creates deception with a funky takeaway in his delivery that one scout felt impacts his command, but he has thrown enough strikes in the past. The deception is a key part of his overall package. While he needs some polish to that delivery, Cleavinger projects as a power lefty reliever. He should pitch in the bullpen in 2016, starting at low Class A Delmarva.

Selected as a 2016 South Atlantic League (A) Midseason All-Star with Delmarva...Was named Orioles Minor League Pitcher of the Month for April after he went 3-0 with a 1.84 ERA and 21 strikeouts in six games...Went 5-0 with a 1.38 ERA in 17 games (4-for-4 on saves) for the Shorebirds before being assigned to the Frederick Keys (A+) in the Carolina League on June 23...Had a 4.82 ERA in 20 appearances, but finished with 49 SO/23 BB in 37.1 innings.

2015:

Burst onto the scene as a rookie with Aberdeen (A-) in the New York-Penn League, compiling a 6-1 record with a 2.16 ERA in 19 appearances...Held opponents to a .165 average while totaling 32 SO/18 BB in 25.0 innings...Started his career by not allowing a run in his first 12 appearances, spanning 16.0 innings.

Had one of the best single seasons in Oregon history as a freshman in 2013, going 9-0 with a team-leading 1.24 ERA and two saves while striking out 57 batters in 43.2 IP...Set Oregon freshman records for appearances (37) and ERA...Held opposing hitters to a .137 batting average, the lowest single-season mark by an Oregon pitcher in school history...Nine wins were tied for the fifth most in school history, while his 37 appearances ranks second all-time...Had notable wins against #6 Oregon State, #21 Stanford (twice), and South Dakota State at the NCAA Tournament Regional.

Despite opening a lot of eyes in Spring Training, it came as no surprise when Dominguez was optioned back to minor league camp on March 13. After being added to the Phillies 40-man roster last November, he pitched in relief in five Grapefruit League games, allowing 1 ER over 4.2 innings. The Phillies have very high hopes for the 23-year-old, who jumped into the organization's **Top-30 prospects lists** (#12, *Baseball America*) (#13, *MLB Pipeline*). While **Sixto Sanchez** drew widespread praise across the minors, Dominguez slipped under the radar and the Phillies decided to add him to the 40-man after exposing him to the Rule 5 Draft at the end of the 2016 season. Health is going to be key for Dominguez, who battled a shoulder injury for about two months last year and has never pitched in more than 17 games during the course of a full season. According to **Jim Salisbury** of *NBC Sports Philadelphia*, the Phillies plan on converting Dominguez into a reliever this season, and Director of Player Development **Joe Jordan** told Salisbury that the righthander could "dominate" as a late-inning reliever.

2017: Named the Florida State League's #13 prospect by Baseball America after the season

Was a **FSL Midseason All-Star** with Clearwater (A+), finishing the season 4-4 with a 3.61 ERA in 15 games (13 starts)...Allowed just 51 hits in 62.1 innings, with 75 SO/30 BB...Went 3-0 in his first seven starts, but didn't pitch between May 13 and July 10 with a right shoulder injury...Made two rehab starts in the Gulf Coast League before returning to Clearwater on July 21...Lost his next three decisions and only pitched 5+ innings twice in his last eight appearances for the Threshers...Pitched in seven games with the Gigantes del Cibao in the Dominican Winter League after the season.

2016:

Garcia re-enters *Baseball America's* Phillies Top-30 Prospects list at #28 for the 2018 season (#24 in in 2016) after making the transition into the rotation last season in Clearwater. Having been linked to fellow Dominican righthanders **Franklyn Kilome** and **Adonis Medina** since the trio came up together in 2014, Garcia is going to be a part of what should be one of the best starting staffs in the minors in Reading. *Baseball America* also ranked his slider as the best in the organization, which is a good building block for pitching coach **Steve Schrenk** as he prepares to fully work with the 21-year-old for the first time. Garcia's numbers didn't jump off the page in the usually pitcher-friendly Florida State League last season, but it's important to remember it was also his busiest season as he worked 88.2 innings (previous high was 61 in 2016). He made his first start on May 20, and only pitched once more in relief for the rest of the season. The encouraging thing is that Garcia doesn't have a lot of miles on his arm, and his overall splits were much better as a starter despite surrendering a hit per inning.

2017:

Pitched the entire season in Clearwater (A+), where he went 3-4 with a 4.47 ERA in 27 games (15 starts)...In 88.2 innings, allowed 10 home runs with 89 SO/31 BB...Had his best start on July 26 against Daytona (Reds), when he threw a career-high 6.2 scoreless innings in a 3-0 shutout for his final decision of the season...Spent 9 days on the Disabled List from August 8-17...Appeared in 8 games with the Estrellas de Oriente in the Dominican Winter League after the season and allowed 8 ER on 12 hits in just 6.2 innings.

2016: Ranked as the Phillies #24 prospect by Baseball America

Got off to a great start in Lakewood (A), where he posted a 1.35 ERA in his first 13 South Atlantic League games (4 ER in 26.2 innings)...Went 4-1 with a 2.80 ERA in 27 games (4 starts), with 10 of those outings being scoreless appearances of 2.0 innings or more...Came out of the bullpen for two playoff games against Rome,

throwing 2.2 scoreless innings with just one hit allowed...Pitched in the Florida Instructional League after the season.

2015:

Didn't make his first appearance in the Gulf Coast League until June 25, when he worked 3.0 scoreless innings for the win in relief against the GCL Pirates...Had a 2.52 ERA in 10 relief appearances, and allowed just 16 hits in 25.0 innings while striking out 26...Overall, righties hit just .175 against him and he only allowed 2 hits in 30 ABs (.067) with runners in scoring position.

Gilbert will combine with **Garrett Cleavinger** to give **Greg Legg** two lefthanded options in the bullpen to start the season. Last year, the combination of **Joey DeNato** and **Austin Davis** filled the same role, and both pitchers were adept at getting out of spots with runners on base. Gilbert's move to the bullpen last season produced solid results, and his 1-6 record in 35 games wasn't really indicative of his sub-3 earned run average. Despite missing close to three weeks in May with a feared left forearm strain, the California native returned to put up slightly better numbers during the second half of the season. Like DeNato and Davis, Gilbert only allowed the Florida State League to hit .206 (13-for-63) with runners in scoring position. Added to the Phillies 40-man roster in the offseason to protect him from the Rule 5 Draft, this is going to be a huge season for the 22-year-old Kilome. A deeper look inside Leftwich's 2017 numbers shows he was one of the best relievers in the Florida State League despite a misleading 1-6 record with Clearwater (A+). His 42 appearances placed him amongst the Top-10 of all Phillies minor league pitchers, and he boasted an impressive SO/9 IP ratio of 11 that was good for 3rd amongst all FSL relief pitchers. The full-time move to the bullpen didn't have much of an effect on the 7th round pick in 2015, who spent his first year-and-a-half in the organization as a starter. He'll turn 24 two months into the season, and with more than 50 appearances for the Threshers the last two seasons, Leftwich will be a featured member of the Fightin Phils bullpen on Opening Day. Last season, Leftwich dominated lefthanded hitters and his second half blew away his first half numbers, which showed he was able to adjust to High-A hitters. If he's going to be used in late-inning situations, he'll need to improve on his save totals (8-for-14), but he can certainly build on what was an otherwise impressive 2017 season.

A Midseason and Postseason All-Star in the Florida State League last season, McGarry went from Bradenton to Clearwater at the trade deadline when the Phillies sent **RHP Joaquín Benoit** to the Pirates. Added to the Phillies 40-man roster last November, Suarez is part of the package of talented young minor league starters that the organization's hit on in the international selection process. They've taken their time with him, and up until last season, he had never made more than 14 starts in a single season. As a result, he hasn't thrown a whole lot of innings despite debuting at 16 and spending his first three seasons in the Venezuelan Summer League. *MLB Pipeline* has Suarez down at #12 while *Baseball America* has tabbed him as the Phillies #11 prospect, marking the first time he's ever been on either list. *Baseball America* pointed out that 2017 was his first year with the full-season affiliates, and that the timing was impeccable because his velocity increased.

Other notes: "He incorporated his legs more in his delivery, which helped him use his whole body to generate more power. His changeup also improved as he adjusted his hand position, which changed the movement on the pitch from cutting action to a more traditional sink and fade to run away from righthanded hitters. Suarez has control and pitching savvy beyond his years, with the ability to read swings, set hitters up, and throw any pitch in any count. He's a good athlete who controls the running game well with a quick pickoff move."

Not that this *Baseball America* write-up is gospel, but it's very encouraging, and paints a nice picture of a lefthander who will have every opportunity to shine in a Fightin Phils uniform in 2018.

Not much was known about Waguespack prior to the 2017 season, but he certainly changed all that after making a successful transition into the starting rotation at the end of May. *Baseball America's* scouting report suggested his velocity increased quite a bit after he started using his legs more in his delivery, and he enters the 2018 season as their #29 Phillies prospect. Not bad for a righthander who went undrafted out of Ole Miss in 2015 after a college career spent in the bullpen. Waguespack commands a big presence on the mound, where his size made him appear to be one of the tallest pitchers in the Eastern League in 2017. It might have come as a surprise to some to see him on the mound pitching in a Triple-A playoff game, but he was spectacular in his IronPigs debut despite taking the loss. With just seven appearances in Reading a year ago and a total of 16 minor league starts, Waguespack needs a little more seasoning before the organization knows what kind of starting pitcher he can be. That being said, his introduction was a very promising one, and he should spend most of his age-24 season locked into one of the five spots in the Fightin Phils rotation.

A late addition to the Phillies as Spring Training broke, Bednar will be a valued presence on the Fightin Phils after coming over from the Giants organization. Approaching 200 Double-A games for his career after spending the last year-and-a-half with the Flying Squirrels, Bednar's versatility on the infield is what's made him a commodity since he was drafted in the seventh round in 2013. With the ability to play any position on the diamond and an approach at the plate that drives opposing pitchers crazy, Bednar owns a .282 batting average in the Eastern League. He was also a picture of health for a San Francisco organization that was decimated by injuries a year ago, appearing in more than 100 games for the fourth straight season. While he might not start out of the gate, Bednar's an old-school type player who can plug in at any time and will embrace any role. He flew under the radar while with the Giants, and the big league club's infield depth made it challenging for most minor leaguers to get to San Francisco. Bednar will hit Double-A pitching, so hopefully an opportunity will present itself where can get to Triple-A for the first time as he enters his sixth season.

Bossart has some local appeal for Fightins fans after being taken by the Phillies in the 14th round of the 2015 draft out of UPenn. Fans actually got to see him for one game in August against Akron, when he went 1-for-4 before being sent right back down to the Florida State League to play in Tampa the following night. But such is the life of a minor leaguer. Bossart had his busiest season last year when he racked up 180 at-bats in 54 games, so he's still fresh despite playing a grueling position for the last 2-plus seasons as a pro. After the 2016 season, the catcher was assigned to the Scottsdale Scorpions in the Arizona Fall League, which has been a valuable springboard for plenty of players over the years. He closed out that 2016 season very strong by hitting .340 in 18 games for Clearwater (A+), an impressive number in a usually pitcher-friendly league. The key for Bossart is playing time, and by extension, more at-bats so that he can continue to develop as a hitter while working with some of the Phillies younger pitchers. With so many imports coming up from last year's Threshers team, having Bossart and **Deivi Grullon** back behind the plate should ease the transition into the Eastern League for this rather young staff.

Canelo was ranked by *MLB.com* as the Phillies #28 prospect coming into 2017 after playing in just over 200 games with Clearwater (A+) over parts of the previous three seasons. Entering his age-23 season, there shouldn't be too much concern that his average has fallen over the last two seasons after he hit a career-best .281 in 2015. According to one *Baseball America* report, one of the keys to his breakout 2015 season was his ability to add some weight in the offseason to help him drive the ball. He's been durable throughout his career with just one brief DL stint in 2014, and 537 of his career 542 games have come at shortstop. Canelo is a good defender, and while he did commit 23 errors a year ago, his defense improved as the season continued. After getting off to a pretty good start in his first two months at Double-A, he combined to hit .185 (28-for-151) in June and July, which took some of the wind out of his sails. Canelo has manager **Greg Legg's** trust after the pair spent the last few seasons together, so Canelo should be able to bounce back this season. While the infield situation in Lehigh Valley can certainly change as the season's gone on, Canelo's age doesn't mean he'll need to be rushed to Triple-A. It might actually benefit him to get most of his at bats in the Eastern League to get back to where he was at the plate in 2015, and then send him up when the rosters expand late in the season. Prior to the season starting, he was 1-for-4 with an RBI and a stolen base in four Grapefruit League games.

Coppola's name continued to pop up throughout Spring Training when the Phillies brought over minor league players for some spot time during the Grapefruit League season. The speedy outfielder impressed **Gabe Kapler** and the coaching staff by doing what he always does, and that is get on base and run. Coppola was 3-for-11 with three walks, adding two RBIs and three stolen bases with the big league club. He's been a model of consistency since the Phillies selected him in the 13th round in 2015, and while he's not on any prospect lists, he led all Phillies minor leaguers with 39 stolen bases on 54 tries a year ago. After playing in just 76 games during his first full season in 2016, he spent a good chunk of last season manning center field for the Fightin Phils. His .252 average in the Eastern League isn't indicative of how important he was to the top of the lineup, and in all likelihood, fatigue was a factor after he burst onto the scene by hitting .286 in 24 June games. He'll be back in Reading's outfield to start the season, and with **Carlos Tocci** joining the Rangers in the Rule 5 Draft, Coppola's path to Triple-A and beyond is definitely easier.

At times, injuries have taken their toll on Green, a former two-time Top-20 Phillies prospect according to *Baseball America*. Last season, a right elbow issue that wiped out the last two-and-a-half weeks of his All-Star season in 2016 caused him to miss nearly three months. The good news is that he was finally able to make his Reading debut halfway through August, setting the stage for him to begin the 2018 season in Baseballtown. The 24-year-old has shown he has power, twice topping 10 home runs during his first six seasons in the Phillies organization. He had a resurgent season for Clearwater (A+) in 2016 after missing most of the 2015 season with a wrist injury. Just a few years removed from leading the New York-Penn League with 13 home runs in 2013, Green showed some of that power by clubbing 12 home runs to finish second on the Threshers. He tends to feast on left-handed pitching while showing more power against righties, an interesting combination that could serve him very well in the middle of the Fightin Phils lineup when's playing either corner infield position or DH'ing against an American League affiliated team.

A three-time Top-20 prospect by *Baseball America* from 2014-16, Grullon surfaced in Reading for the first time in late July and became the starting catcher for the final month of the season while **Chace Numata** missed time with a concussion. While he combined to hit a career-high 12 home runs after making his first All-Star team with Clearwater, it was Grullon's defense that stood out over the course of 94 games. Grullon was part of a talented catching trio [including Numata and **Nick Rickles** that helped negate opposing teams' baserunning by throwing out 45% of would-be base stealers last season. Grullon's personal season average was an impressive 36% (40-of-109), up from 27.8% the previous season. A career .241 hitter across 414 minor league games, Grullon is still young and developing after signing out of the Dominican Republic when he was 16 years old. One of his earliest *Baseball America* scouting reports suggested the Phillies projected Grullon to hit 10-15 home runs if he could get his average up to .250, which is almost exactly what he produced last season. Signed out of Puerto Rico in 2013, the Phillies have been very deliberate in their advancement of Hernandez, who played 23 games in right field for the first time last season after coming up as a third baseman. That move appears to be more than just an experiment, which leaves Hernandez looking like the fourth outfielder on the Opening Day roster. While his strikeouts rose and his on-base percentage dipped in Clearwater (A+) last season, Hernandez also smacked a career-high 16 home runs to lead the Threshers and tie for second in the Florida State League. He has a chance to raise that number this season playing at FirstEnergy Stadium, although the jump in pitching quality will be one to monitor as he gets deeper into his first year at Double-A. Looking at Hernandez brings to mind what **Jiandido Tromp** faced coming to Reading last season, and he handled the move just fine by having a very impressive season. Like Tromp, Hernandez does very well against left-handed pitching, and now has an opportunity to mesh all his tools in his age-23 season.

The versatile infielder bumped his average up to a career-high .252 last season while playing in 109 games with Clearwater (A+), with 86 starts coming at shortstop. With both Marrero and Malquin Canelo on the Opening Day roster, Greg Legg has a decision to make, but the good news is that the depth is there. Coming out of Alabama State University in the seventh round in 2014, several scouts considered Marrero to be the best defensive shortstop in that year's college draft class. Now, he'll probably test the waters a little bit more at both second base (17 career starts) and third base (29 career starts) so that he gives himself the best chance to get on the field. A rumbling power bat in the lower-levels of the Phillies system, Martin's 19 home runs in 2016 left him right outside the Top-10 on the organization's leaderboard. During a full season last year in Reading, he jacked 22 home runs which was good enough for sixth on the minor league side. Playing in a career-high 123 games, Martin led the 2017 Fightin Phils with 68 runs batted in while tying for third in the Eastern League with 134 strikeouts. Coming out of Spring Training a year ago, Martin was one of the talks of camp, so a second trip through the Eastern League should boost his average. He had a .993 fielding percentage in 116 games at first base, and will likely start the 2018 season smack in the middle of the lineup. On the fast track since the Phillies made him the 10th overall pick in the 2015 draft, Randolph is coming off his busiest season after playing in 122 games with Clearwater (A+) a year ago. He'll be extremely young for Double-A no matter when he gets to Reading, and his arrival will likely put **Jiandido Tromp** in right if they're on the roster at the same time. Randolph tapped into some power in the usually homer-deprived Florida State League last season, tying for eighth on the circuit with 13 home runs after hitting just three in his first 127 games. While his strikeout numbers increased a bit last year, it shouldn't come as a huge surprise given his rapid advancement through the system. The encouraging thing is that Randolph didn't seem to tire out like many players do when they're stretched out for the first time. As a matter of fact, he hit 45 points higher during the second half of the season, and can hopefully build off that as he prepares for the jump to the Eastern League. He has long been praised for his bat, and now has the added benefit of a short porch in right field inside the inviting surroundings of FirstEnergy Stadium.

While the baseball world talks about Tim Tebow being with the Rumble Ponies, Sandberg was a two-sport star at Manatee High School in Bradenton, Florida and had committed to play quarterback at Mississippi State before the Phillies came calling. He showed off his athleticism with Lakewood in 2015, where he won an MiLB Gold Glove Award for his work in left field. A two-time Top-30 prospect according to *Baseball America*, he's drawn rave reviews for his two-strike approach and work ethic. Last season, he split time between Lakewood (A), Clearwater (A+), and Reading, and batted .314 (16-for-51) in his last 16 games with the Fightin Phils before shutting it down for good after August 21. Sandberg hit a career-high 9 home runs a year ago while matching a career-high with 28 doubles, so he should be able to top both those numbers if he's given a full season in the Eastern League. While he's spent more time in left field, he can also play right, which should give **Greg Legg** plenty of options with both **Zach Coppola** and **Jiandido Tromp** returning.

2017:

Had six multi-hit efforts in his first nine games with Lakewood (.447)...Had 6 outfield assists in 54 games for the BlueClaws, and hit .292 against righties compared to .213 against lefties...Assigned to Clearwater (A+) on June 5 for a month, batting .277 (18-for-65) with two homers, seven doubles, and six runs batted in across 18 games...Called up to Reading on July 4, and spent the rest of the season with the Fightin Phils...Singled in his third at-bat on July 4 in Trenton...Recorded his first RBI with a single against the Sea Dogs on July 7 and had his first multi-RBI game against Portland the following day...His first Double-A home run was a game-winning solo shot off **Paul Voelker** in the bottom of the ninth in a 4-3 win over Erie on July 21...Had three 3-hit games in a six day span from August 6-11...Batted .309 (26-for-84) with RISP for the season.

Was a Florida State League Midseason All-Star with Clearwater (A+), where he played in 94 games...Had his best month in April, when he batted .297 (22-for-74) with a home run, 3 doubles, and six runs batted in...Had 20 multi-hit games during the season...Hit .164 against left-handed pitching and .248 against righties...Went to the DL twice in August with a right thumb sprain and a right cheekbone contusion that limited him to just four games in the final month.

Tomscha's breakout 2017 season was split between Reading and Clearwater (A+), and the corner infielder emerged as one of the Phillies hottest minor league hitters during the final month of the season. After getting called up to Double-A in mid-July, Tomscha admitted he was trying to do too much and was chasing pitches he wouldn't normally go after. The adjustment didn't take long, and over his last 35 games, he batted .328 while stringing together a Fightins' best 15-game hitting streak from August 7-21. During that streak he had a .424 average, and overall played a very solid third base while **Mitch Walding** missed time with an injury. Tomscha can also play first base, and he could fill in for **Kyle Martin** on days he sits with a lefthanded starter on the mound. In total, he was 35-for-98 (.357) against lefthanded pitchers a year ago, and while his doubles totals were cut in half from the previous season, Tomscha flashed some pop and hit a career-high 11 home runs. He doesn't strike out very often, and as long as he doesn't try to do too much again out of the gate in Reading, Tomscha has a very good chance to get his first opportunity in Lehigh Valley (AAA) during the the season.

Led all qualifying Phillies full-season minor leaguers with a .307 batting average (115 hits in 374 ABs)...Started the season in Clearwater (A+), where he got off to a fast start by putting together an 11-game hitting streak from April 17-29 (.419, 12 runs batted in, .978 OPS)...Spent time on the disabled list with a right groin strain from June 21-July 12...Singled in his first Double-A at-bat off Binghamton's **Mickey Jannis** on July 14...Had an RBI in three straight games from July 28-30...During his season-long 15-game hitting streak from August 7-21, he had 9 multi-hit games.

Opened the season with Lakewood (A), where he played in two games before being summoned to Clearwater for a six-game cameo (2-for-19 with 4 strikeouts)...Returned to the BlueClaws for the remainder of the season Duand hit .283 (8th in the South Atlantic League) with five home runs and 54 runs batted in...T-5th in the SAL with 32 doubles and finished 8th with a .369 on-base percentage...Hit safely in all six South Atlantic League playoff games, finishing 9-for-18 with three doubles, a home run, and five runs batted in.

Damek Martel Soren Tomscha finally signed in the 17th round of the 2014 June draft after passing three other times during the selection process: 2010 (Phillies, 50th round), 2011 (Marlins, 36th round), and 2012 (Cubs, 19th round)...A 2014 graduate of Auburn University, he spent his last two seasons with the Tigers after beginning his college career at lowa Western Community College...As a senior in 2014, finished second on the team with a .313 average and 29 runs batted in across 53 starts...Led Auburn in home runs (5) and OBP (.436)/SLG % (.443)...Started 53 games at third base during his junior season in 2013, hitting .274 while tying for the team lead with seven home runs...Had an .836 OPS and hit a game-winning home run against Maine in his first Auburn game...Named the SEC Player of the Week on May 6 after hitting a game-tying and game-winning home run in the Tigers two comeback wins against #18 Ole Miss...Among his accomplishments at the JUCO level with lowa Western CC: JUCO World Series Championship, was twice named the #18 JUCO prospect by *Perfect Game* in 2011 and 2012, 2012 First Team NJCAA All-American, hit 30 home runs and drove in 125 runs over two full seasons...Was a 3-time All-State selection at Sioux City North High School and was the 2010 *Gatorade, Louisville Slugger, and lowa High School Coaches* Player of the Year...Is the youngest of five children.

Tromp set the tone early in his first season at Double-A, blasting a double off the left field wall against **Mark Appel** in the annual 222 Showcase against the IronPigs at Coca-Cola Park. The Aruban born outfielder had a career year in 2017, hitting a career-best .285 with the Fightin Phils while smacking 31 doubles, which was good for second in the Eastern League. Tromp's 130 hits (7th in EL) were second only to **Carlos Tocci's** 132, and he finished 4th in the league with 52 extra-base hits, while ranking 8th with a .482 slugging percentage. During the season, he received his first Triple-A call-up and went 2-for-9 with a double and two RBIs for the IronPigs in early June. Defensively, he was perfect in the outfield on 200 chances between the two clubs, splitting time between the corners with most of his action coming in right field. The arrival of former first round pick **Cornelius Randolph** probably makes Tromp the Opening Day right fielder, which is a welcome sight for this Fightin Phils lineup. Surprisingly, Tromp has never made it onto any top prospects lists, but eventually someone is going to have to take notice of what he's done at the plate for the last two seasons. If he can balance out his splits a little bit against lefty/righty pitching (.354/.247), Tromp should carve a path back to Allentown for more than just a few days this season.

2017: Eastern League Midseason All-Star; EL & Phillies Minor League Player of the Week from June 19-25

Hit three doubles for the first time in his career on May 7 in Portland...Later hit two home runs for the fourth time in his career against the Sea Dogs in a 6-2 win in game one of a doubleheader on May 31...Had a season-high 9-game hitting streak with the Fightins from May 31-June 15 (15-for-39, .384)...Hit a solo home run in three straight games against the RubberDucks from June 20-22...In 22 June games with Reading, hit .338 (27-for-80) with 11 XBH and a .992 OPS...Broke up a shutout with an RBI double in the 9th inning of a 6-2 loss against Altoona on July 26...Hit a 3-run home run in the 7th inning of a 3-1 win in Hartford on July 27...Hit .316 for the month of July (30-for-95) with 8 XBH and 11 runs batted in...Hit a game-winning 2-run homer in the 6th inning of a 4-2 win against the RubberDucks on August 5...Singled home the winning run in the bottom of the

15th on August 15 against Bowie...Brought in all 3 Fightins run in a 4-3 loss to the Baysox on August 16...Finished the season 3rd on the Fightin Phils by hitting .306 with runners in scoring position (33-for-108).
